Chief Report 10/14/2024

North Division Operations:

Fire season operations are in full swing. The Glenhaven Incident was a significant event in Clearlake Oaks, and the North Division assisted with it.

Camp Operations:

The Camp Captains and CDCR are working to staff and train a third fire crew. While the crew is still being built, it looks promising to have an additional response crew.

South Lake Operations:

We are patiently working through the hiring process for the new Battalion Chief. Several delays have resulted from the turnover of our hiring staff in the Unit and at our Region headquarters. There is no timeframe, but we are cautiously optimistic that it will be filled in the next few weeks.

Our new GMC Battalion Chief vehicle, B1417A, is completing additional outfitting for radios and the 'command slide' in the bed when the truck operates in the incident command role.

Station Build—We continue meeting with the architect and completing the specifications. The meetings address multiple challenges with the location, including relocating underground power, propane, and water services.

Our fleet staff is actively searching for a tractor to purchase as part of the CLERC grant so that they can move around our excavator.

Next up for the fleet purchase will be a replacement for Water Tender 6011, which should be referred to the Facilities and Equipment Committee.

The next new Ambulance order should be entered soon to meet the 24-30-month delivery window. The Ambulance purchases aim to standardize the fleet in both the boxes on the back and the chassis. After this next new purchase, we will start rotating the fleet into the 'remount' process, which will remove, refurbish, and then remount the box on a new chassis. These savings are around \$80,000 instead of a fully equipped new unit.
